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

#### UMA PRABHU CHAIRPERSON

o one could have ever imagined that a tiny speck of life, a microscopic organism - the SARS CoV-2 virus, would have a catastrophic effect of the magnitude that we experienced worldwide.

COVID-19 emerged as a huge global health crisis, as gruesome and devastating as the great influenza pandemic of 1918. Like the previous pandemic, the economic and social disruption caused by this one too was devastating, negatively impacting every aspect of human life, be it health, business, employment, livelihood, food security, finances, families, students, relationships, significantly and severely.

Close to six million people worldwide lost their lives; millions fell into extreme poverty and the number of undernourished people multiplied. The loss of jobs too was dramatic and unprecedented.

India was no exception. Like all other organisation - big and small businesses, educational institutes, social service outfits

- Manav Sadhan Vikas Sanstha (MSVS) too was reeling under this unprecedented crisis. All programs came to an end. Our nursing college closed down. Construction of the new academic campus, a very crucial aspect for various statutory permissions, came to a standstill.

Our campus was turned into a COVID ward as the local self-government requested us for space to accommodate the ever-increasing number of COVID patients. Being a social service institution, we relented. I feel proud to say that our staff, teachers, even student nurses worked overtime making whatever contribution they could to help alleviate the sufferings of the affected and also manage the situation.

At our Navi Mumbai HQ, all courses had to be abandoned. Although no revenue was coming in, yet as a group with multiple social service institutions, we took a decision not to sack any employee. We kept telling ourselves, "This too shall pass".

The nightmare was a bit too long. But the



sun did shine again. Slowly but steadily normalcy returned, programs started, revenue started coming in. There was a silver lining to the dark cloud - in August 2021, the Government of India's Skills and Entrepreneurship Development Ministry awarded us a Jana Shikshan Sanstha for Ratnagiri district. We had been trying for this since 2009.

We were also successful in getting an approval from the Government of Maharashtra for increasing our GNM (General Nursing and Midwifery course) intake from 20 to 40. We also got approval for starting an Auxiliary Nursing and Midwifery Course.

Donations came in cash and kind. With the help of the Airport Authority of India (AAI), we started a Cycle Bank in the schools of Sindhudurg and Ratnagiri districts. Any student could use these cycles and return it to the school after the use was done. Thanks to AAI again, we started Sewing Machine Banks, again in both the districts.

The Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) and through CII, other industries collaborated with us on several skill development courses at Sindhudurg and Navi Mumbai. The derailed train was back on the tracks!

Looking back, however, we feel that what we, as grassroots workers, learned in these two years was more than we could have learned anytime or anywhere else.

The journey is ongoing - destination a bit distant - a mission to reach as many as possible, to wipe off their tears, to get smiles on the faces of multitudes, to help all willing hands so their loved ones will never go hungry.

Our hunger of more work grows, with more vigour and stronger determination.

We shall move on - yes with everyone's support

Come on, let's join hands.

## MSVS ORIGINS & EVOLUTION

#### MSVS, Progression through Survival-Revival-Resurgence

Perseverance is the key to success in any endeavour. The Manav Sadhan Vikas Sanstha (MSVS) as a charitable trust since its inception in 1997, has trekked 24 meaningful years as a philanthropic organisation committed to the holistic development of the underprivileged and neglected sections. As it inches towards another milestone year, it emerges as a beacon light that touches over 750,000 lives by creating a sustainable living for them. It is a measure of its resilience and determination that an endeavour that started almost from the scratch with minimal resources, is now a strong ray of hope for people aiming to be self-reliant.

In pursuance of its goal, the MSVS began in earnest in Sindhudurg and Ratnagiri regions. This trek was arduous but worth its rewards and results. The MSVS grew and evolved all through these years, punctuated with attendant issues like managing financial resources, infrastructural hiccups and finding worthwhile human capital. The MSVS survived all these odds with no let up or compromise in enriching lives and enhancing self-esteem. It went from strength to strength leaving no stone unturned in its lofty quests.

The MSVS draws its strength from its institutional edifice. Relentless commitment and the willingness to explore newer territories enabled it to navigate even the debilitating COVID-19 pandemic through its theme of **Survival-Revival-Resurgence**. It did that in the chronological order to remain abiding and inflexible in its aim of uplifting the lesser fortunate sections of society and provide them with the much-needed stability quotient in their lives.



In the preceding years, the MSVS has created a muscular framework for a dynamic and high-impact future by finalizing a number of tie-ups, putting in place systems and processes for taking initiatives forward at an accelerated pace. As a public charitable trust, its underlining motto is to bring about a holistic and integrated development of underprivileged communities, and underdeveloped regions. It seeks to meet this objective through the proactive participation of both – governmental and non-governmental stakeholders.

MSVS envisages a comprehensive, holistic approach towards development, integrating economic, social, physical, ecological, intellectual and spiritual aspects. Reflecting these thoughts, the stated mission of MSVS is 'To promote a holistic and integrated development of underprivileged communities and underdeveloped regions.'

Its objectives are: Community development through education and employability skills programs, Women Empowerment, Natural resource management, Employment generation/ Entrepreneurship development, Institutionalization and creation of a committed cadre, and, Rural development by providing basic amenities and sustainable livelihood.

Conscious that education is the key in community development, the MSVS has been working ceaselessly by offering the underdeveloped sections various courses. These programs not only educate them, they empower them through learning employability skills that will generate steady income and extricate them from poverty and trying circumstances.

Over the recent years, the trust has laid a marked emphasis on training people to secure employment and also focused on developing an entrepreneurial attitude among them. It has created a number of committed and skilled entrepreneurs while also advancing rural populations by providing basic amenities and a sustainable livelihood.

The trust, in tandem with like-minded individuals and institutions has been able to create an impactful change through their efforts and various collaborative ventures as well. It reaches out to social service-oriented foundations and institutions keen to walk the talk on Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) activities.

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The COVID-19 pandemic threw world life out of gear but the MSVS did not lose sight of its mission and now with the worst behind, it not only endures and persists, not resting on its past laurels, but also renews its endeavours with its customary zeal.

#### ACTIVITIES

If the MSVS has reached the stature it has today, it is because of its strong foundation. The taller the structure envisaged, the deeper the foundation required. All its limbs have put together an exemplary show in uplifting the unprivileged sections and alleviate poverty in the best possible way.

Although the COVID-19 was a dampener, the efforts of the MSVS did not lose traction. It continued to elicit support and strength from various partnerships in its bid to ensure the mission trajectory, retaining the thrust in providing much-needed employment opportunities to those who need them the most. Unfazed in the face of the global emergency, the MSVS kept stitching success stories that it had envisaged since its inception. The constant support from well-meaning quarters kept it going throughout the pandemic, even as it pooled its resources with careful planning.



Empowering lakhs of underprivileged people and making them self-reliant is a challenging task but The MSVS through its facilities has been conceptualising and providing a wide spectrum of livelihood opportunities at multiple destinations as part of its mission.

Setting up facilities at Jana Shikshan Sansthan at Oras, both in Sindhudurg district, has played a significant role in making the MSVS quest a reality. These facilities are:

#### Jana Shikshan Sansthan, Sindhudurg

Established in 2001, the Jana Shikshan Sansthan Sindhudurg (JSSS) has been aiming to extend non-formal education facilities to the marginalized and underprivileged sections in the region, with the goal of making them self-reliant as well as empowered. The Sindhudurg chapter became the first rural JSS to be formally set up in India. With the support of the Skill and Entrepreneurship Development Ministry, Government of India, JSSS runs vocational education programs for the school dropouts, neo-literates, illiterates and marginalized persons in Sindhudurg district. Over 70,000 people have so far benefited from the various training programs conducted by JSSS; the noteworthy aspect being 85 percent of these are women. JSSS has already received an Occupancy

Certificate in February '22 for its new building at Oras on a plot of land obtained from the Collector of Sindhudurg District.

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> The Jana Shikshan Sansthan Sindhudurg (JSSS) has accorded training to 600 widows in fashion designing, and with Loomba, an international Philanthropic Foundation, in distributing an equal number of sewing machines to make these women earn a livelihood. The JSS along with the MSVS also partnered with Hero Cycles created a cycle bank in different schools in the region for facilitating rural transportation. 500 state-of-the art bicycles were distributed to women and youngsters in the Sindhudurg Ratnagiri project area to facilitate commuting. The JSSS has trained a total of 1332 persons in 15 different traits; helped 14 deserving persons to get loans worth Rs 8,00,000 from Mudra Yojana and other schemes for starting businesses in garment making and beauty and wellness services.

> The JSSS in partnership with Confederation of Indian Industry (CII), FIAT, Blue Star and Saini shall set up various specialised training labs at its Oras HQ and utilise MSVS's Parivartan Kendra (Transformation Centres) network to popularise these employment generating courses. These shall prove to be boon to the locals as CII has a proven track record of great placements. The MSVS has now over 250 Parivartan Kendras (PK) in the project area, which is a network of local resources, grassroots intelligence and talent that act as a pipeline for propagating established and new ideas. Different industries are likely to utilize this strong network to further their cause while helping the locals to prosper.

# Computer Education through the Ford Foundation

Between 2000-2006, the MSVS developed a project with the support from Ford Foundation. The focus was on strengthening the school computer laboratories, guiding and training potential school teachers to implement the government curriculum for students of 8th, 9th and 10th standards in selected schools in the target region. Twenty teachers and about 2000 students benefited with 5000 other residents connected with schools and the students. They too were able to



gain awareness and education about computer usage during various village meetings organized by MSVS.

# Parivartan Kendras/Transformation Centres

The 'Parivartan Kendras' (PKs) or transformation centres are aimed at the overall upgradation and improvement of the people in villages. JSSS has established a transformation centre for each cluster of 10 villages in Sindhudurg district and 250 such centres were formed. 46 of these 105 centres are active. The 'Parivartan Kendras' are meant to serve as hubs of development activities. These centres are equipped with a gymnasium, skills training through JSSS for economic development and computer training for intellectual development. Additionally, it held sports competitions, health camps and cultural programs for social and cultural development.

#### Dyanada (Internet Kiosks)

With the Dyanada model, the MSVS introduced information technology (IT) to the people living across Konkan region. In co-operation with the National Informatics Centre, MSVS came up with an elaborate and comprehensive, threephased program of setting up Internet Kiosks at the block headquarters. Ten such centres were established. Information pertaining to various government schemes, agricultural practices,

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land record forms, application forms for various certificates issued by the local government was made available to the needy at these Internet access centres at the click of the mouse. The late Dr. Abdul Kalam, former President of India, launched this program just before he became the President. It was this MSVS experiment in a rural setting that had inspired the late former President to deliver his famous speech on the digital divide.

#### **Mobile Hospital**

MSVS launched its "health on wheels" program around the year 2000. It started a mobile diagnostic clinic to transport medical care to the remotest hamlets of the Sindhudurg district and a few tehsils of the neighbouring Ratnagiri district. The program was funded by Organization of Pharmaceutical Producers' India (OPPI).

#### **Eco Clubs**

With financial assistance from the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India, MSVS organised Eco Clubs in 100 schools for creating environmental awareness among students.

#### Grameen Gyan Abhiyan

MSVS, in collaboration with NIIT and ICICI Limited set up Minimally Invasive Education (MIE) kiosks in predominantly rural and under-developed areas of Sindhudurg district, Maharashtra, like Banda, Deobagh, Shirgaon, Kalse, and Talawade with the aim of testing the concept of minimally invasive education. Unmanned kiosks were started to provide the children from the fishing and farming community an exposure to computers.

#### Global Environmental Facilities (GEF) Small Grants Program

With the help of GEF grants, MSVS established "Centres of Learning" in secondary schools in Sindhudurg and Ratnagiri districts for promoting local response to biodiversity conservation. The goal and purpose of the project was to bring about awareness in school children regarding the conservation of natural resources of the target region. Various techniques were used to sensitize the youth. The list included a survey of the region's flora and fauna, creation of gardens of medicinal plants; demonstration plots of endangered species of plants and ecologically vital herbs.

#### Employability Skills Programs in Mumbai



MSVS launched employability skills programs in Mumbai's shanties in 2011 to enable underprivileged women and men to become self-reliant and live life with dignity. MSVS's skill menu includes beauty and hair care, henna body art, tailoring, fashion designing and embroidery, artificial jewellery, welding and fabrication, plumbing, along with refrigeration and air conditioning (AC) repair. The project has been able to reach over 2,000 beneficiaries so far.

# Skill and Entrepreneurship Development Centre

MSVS established a Skill & Entrepreneurship Development Institute in 2018 on a plot of land



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> awarded by CIDCO at Koparkhairane, Navi Mumbai. In collaboration with well-known brands, the facility will impart state-of-the-art employability skills to the needy and create livelihood opportunities. Courses such as Beauty and Wellness, Fashion Designing, Optical, Driving-cum-Tourist Guides and Health Workers, Culinary Skills/ Bakery/ Food Processing, Jewellery Making, Home Managers, Computer Education, English Speaking will be conducted. Each training centre will also double up as a service centre to make students job ready. Students will also gain soft skills like financial training and digital literacy.

> The Koparkhairane (earlier in Kurla) Centre trained close to 300 women in various traits. At MSVS Skills Cum Entrepreneurship Development Institute the stage is set for collaborations with top brands on skills training in order to impart state-of-theart employability skills to the needy and create livelihood opportunities for them. While some tie-ups have already been initiated, many more should fructify during the financial year 2019-20 and onwards.

> Students will receive on-the-job training at service centres on payment of nominal charges. This will be conducted by renowned trainers who are attached to the training centre at ESDI. Each course will have a soft skills module to develop the student's personalities in a holistic manner.

> Particularly inspiring are case studies of Parveen Mulani, a single parent from Govandi, who chose to challenge the social mores and stood on her own feet. Such stories abound in MSVS. The MSVS has Sunanda Masurkar from Worli, who leads Prerna, a self-help group that is into catering and marketing spice mix and home-made snacks; Sandhya Raut, who has her own beauty clinic and Poonam Dalve, who makes beautiful artificial jewellery and supplies to the ISKCON temple.

#### MSVS School & College of Nursing, Anav

The MSVS is poised to take on the skies; to chart out newer territories in villages, cities and states, touching lives of people for whom the future is not certain. The SoN aims to house courses like B.Sc. Nursing, Physiotherapy and many more



Paramedical Courses. Its Entrepreneurship Development Institute at Koperkhairne with a food lab, computer lab and a beauty department will get ready to serve the needy in that area. The School & College of Nursing, the first of its kind, in village Anav of Sindhudurg district was set up in 2001. The institute, now in its 23rd year, caters exclusively to the girls from this economically backward region. The nursing institute presently imparts General Nursing and Midwifery (GNM) Diploma, and a few paramedical courses.

The institute, which is affiliated to the National and State Nursing Council, has so far trained 300 nurses, who are gainfully employed in various well-known hospitals in Mumbai, Pune, Kolhapur, Ratnagiri and Belgaum. At the SoN complex, plans are afoot to add on more paramedical courses, which being vocational in nature will enable the students to get employment easily. Talks are on to start Ayush programs like Panchakarma and different therapies, which are much in demand.

The MSVS has scripted a number of success stories – individually and collectively, directly and indirectly, to bring forth initiatives and endeavours that inspired and assisted the underprivileged sections during the COVID times and ensured their lives and livelihood was on track. Now that the testing times are behind, the MSVS has rolled up its sleeves once again to begin its efforts with renewed vigour.

The SoN has already conducted several events from the World Asthma Day to Skin Disease Awareness Camps and more.

# ACTIVITY REPORT

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#### MSVS School of Nursing (SoN), Anav

The SoN campus in village Anav (Kudal block) facilitates economic development of rural areas through an education hub. With over four hundred girls of Sindhudurg district from economically and socially weak background passing out with flying colours, the SoN has fructified its efforts. It is a measure of the SoN's success that all the pass-outs have become economically independent, rendering services in government and private hospitals of the state. Some known private hospitals like Lilavati Hospital, Raheja Hospital Mumbai, Nanavati Hospital Mumbai, Fortis Hospital Mumbai, etc provide placement through campus interviews.

The school presently offers two major academic programs in nursing; General Nursing and Midwifery (GNM Diploma Course) and Assistant Nursing and Midwifery (ANM Course). While the Maharashtra Nursing Council (MNC) and the Indian Nursing Council (INC) recognise the Diploma Course, the Maharashtra University of Health Sciences (MUHS) recognises the Degree Course.

The efforts by SoN have been aptly complemented by people who have reposed unflinching faith in the MSVS and the college. The academic results of the SoN since the last twenty years are a testimony to its commitment.

100% placement is assured for passed out students after campus interviews with decent salaries offered by reputed hospitals like the Jaslok, Nanavati, Lilavati Jupitar, Bharti Vedant of Mumbai, and Dinanath Mangeshkar Hospital, Pune. During Year 2020-21, the top three ranking students in the GNM Course were Vaishnavi Vawam Dalvi - 77.80%, Karuna Krishna Parab - 75.00% and Suchita Devram Shedge - 73.20%. Dixsha Rawool got a placement in Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital in Mumbai. After her first successful stint, she got an opportunity at Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital, Mumbai run by the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation.

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The SoN actively aided the local self-government and district administration during the pandemic with infrastructural and other necessary support.

In Year 2021-22, SoN had a total 99 students in the GNM course; 60 in the First Year Batch 2021-22; 19 in the Second Year Batch 2020-21, and 20 in the Third Year Batch 2019-20 with an impressive academic record of 100% results in all the batches. The top three ranking students in the GNM Course were Samita Gotalkar - 72.60%, Ashvini Chorlekar - 71.40% and Kranti Parkar - 70.80%. The placement record of 100% was maintained and Suchita Shegade, a SoN student was placed at Bharti Vedant Hospital, Mira Road, Mumbai.

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#### Skill & Entrepreneurship Development Institute (EDI)

Multi-faceted activities were conducted by the EDI from 2020-22. These endeavours aimed at uplifting communities, enhancing skills, and fostering socio-economic development primarily in the Koparkhairane area of Navi Mumbai.

**Government Scheme Training Program:** MSVS collaborated with ICICI Foundation to implement a comprehensive training program at Koparkhairane, Navi Mumbai. The initiative targeted skill enhancement in various sectors including selling skills, banking and financial services, customer relations, and beauty care. Additionally, an Assistant Beauty Therapist course was conducted, providing participants with practical skills vital for employment opportunities.



**Community Mobilisation Activities:** Recognising the importance of community engagement, mobilisation activities were initiated in the vicinity of Koparkhairane temple. The focus was on advocating COVID-19 awareness and educating the local populace on available government schemes. Through interactive sessions, residents were empowered with knowledge to navigate through these challenging times effectively.



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**English Speaking Course:** Understanding the significance of language proficiency in socio-economic advancement, EDI organised English speaking courses targeting women, girls, and young individuals residing in slum areas in and around Koparkhairane. These courses aimed to bridge the language barrier and equip participants with communication skills essential for personal and professional growth.



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Assistant Beauty Therapist Course: In line with the demand for skilled personnel in the beauty industry, EDI facilitated an Assistant Beauty Therapist course in collaboration with CII. This initiative provided practical training and certification, empowering individuals with the requisite skills for employment or entrepreneurship opportunities in the beauty sector.









**Electrical Training:** Recognising the importance of vocational skills, EDI introduced electrical training programs. These initiatives aimed to equip participants with fundamental electrical knowledge and practical skills, thereby enhancing their employability prospects in the technical domain.











**Cake Making Training:** Acknowledging the growing demand for culinary skills, particularly in baking, EDI conducted cake making training sessions in collaboration with CII. Participants were provided with hands-on experience and theoretical knowledge in cake preparation and decoration, fostering entrepreneurship and income generation opportunities.

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#### (JSSS)

Established in 2001, the Jana Shikshan Sansthan Sindhudurg (JSSS) continued its trajectory in extending non-formal education facilities to the marginalized and underprivileged sections in the region, with the goal of making them self-reliant as well as empowered. The Sindhudurg chapter is the first rural JSS to be formally set up in India.

#### **Capacity Building Programme**

Capacity building program was conducted for JSSS staff on 28/09/2021 in Nandurbar, which included sessions on yoga, positive attitude, NAB-ARD schemes, and PFMS-EAT module, aiming to enhance skills and knowledge. A capacity-building session for 7 JSS-S staff on 15/03/2022 in Goa involved visits to livelihood and manufacturing centres, focusing on hands-on learning and exposure to successful entrepreneurial ventures. On 11/03/2022 in Kudal, Sindhudurg, a program for 8 staff and 58 resource persons featured sessions on personality development, loan schemes, and discussions with trainers, fostering growth and collaboration in JSS initiatives.



#### JSS Ratnagiri registration completed

MSVS took the proverbial first step to implement the Jan Shikshan Sansthan (JSS) Scheme in Ratnagiri. Accordingly, a proposal was sent to the Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship in pursuance of that objective. Following the selection criteria laid down, a new trust was formed in Ratnagiri under the Trust Act & Society Act. MSVS was awarded with Jan Shikshan Sansthan – Ratnagiri (JSS – R) on June 30th, 2021 vide Sanction Ref No. 30/4-2020-JSS(MSDE). JSS – R was incorporated under Societies Registration Act, 1860 on September 22nd, 2021 vide Registration No. G.B.B.S..D.1083/2021 and registered as a charitable Institution with the Charity Commissioner vide Registration Cert No. F-78451 on February 2nd, 2022

# A key role in alleviating the COVID-19 scourge

As the COVID-19 pandemic raged across India, the number of patients too swelled. The country's financial capital, Mumbai too witnessed a surge in the COVID patients; and its effect could also be seen in Konkan's Sindhudurg district. The government imposed a second lockdown, realising that the first did not reduce the number of patients and bring it under control. It also appealed to institutions to make available space to quarantine the rising number of afflicted patients.

Well aware of its social commitment and responsibility, the MSVS made available to the government its 9500 square feet SoN campus building along with the hostel at Anav to be used as a COVID centre. During this period, more than 120 patients were lodged here as part of quarantine. This noble step was taken and sustained by the MSVS despite facing resistance from some of the misguided locals who opposed it based on the premise that although a benevolent step, it might further spread the malaise and jeopardise their health. The ensuing three-month span saw all COVID-19 patients recovering and subsequently discharged. The MSVS bore all the expenses incurred including electricity, water and minor repairs; and did not seek any help from the government.

#### Expansion mode - taking the next step forward



Buoyed by the encouraging results witnessed at its SoN initiative, the MSVS decided to expand the capacity by increasing the number of structures at its campus in Anav by constructing a wellequipped, multi-store, new academic block. The first phase will involve the construction of a 23,000 sq. ft. building. It will have advanced facilities in classrooms, a library, a laboratory, and other essential requisites. The new building is expected to be completed soon.

#### Empowering the marginalised and underprivileged sections

The JSS Sindhudurg (JSSS) has been working relentlessly for the implementation of two projects; "Women Empowerment through Sewing Machines for Livelihood support." and "To set up Girl's Cycle Bank in 100 Middle Schools" in Sindhudurg Ratnagiri resource region under the CSR initiative of Airport Authority of India.

During 2020-21, in Ratnagiri 190 sewing machines were allotted and in Sindhudurg 70 sewing machines were allotted to the selected scrutinized women beneficiaries. A cycle bank was formed in nearly 200 schools from Ratnagiri and Sindhudurg districts, which assists 10 girl students from each school for convenient, faster and safer access to school education. During 2021-22, 1000 sewing machines were allotted to 1000 scrutinized women beneficiaries from Sindhudurg district and 680 sewing machines were allotted to 680 scrutinized women beneficiaries in Ratnagiri district. Similarly, 1000 cycles were allotted to 114 schools in Sindhudurg and 630 cycles in 63 schools in Ratnagiri district, which benefitted 1630 school girl students from the two districts.

#### **Exponentially raising vocational** learning capacity

Enthused by the response to the courses offered at its campus in Anav and accomplishments of the SoN alumni, the MSVS decided to expand its existing capacity to facilitate an even greater number of students. The seats for General Nursing and Midwifery (GNM) were tripled by enhancing them from 20 to 60 while 40 seats were introduced for Auxiliary Nursing and Midwifery (ANM), with both being approved by the Maharashtra Board of Nursing and Paramedical Education.

# Two impactful collaborations initiated with the CII

The Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) and MSVS have worked together to provide skill training and employment to the youth and women at the MSVS EDI at Koparkhairane in two major sectors; Multi-Cuisine Cooking and Electrician Domestic Solution. The responsibility of managing the training labs required for both the sectors was undertaken by MSVS while CII provided the support for mobilisation, training and placement.

The CII is a non-government, industry-led, and industry-managed organization, with over 9000 members from the private as well as public sectors, including SMEs and MNCs, and an indirect membership of over 300,000 enterprises from 294 national and regional sectoral industry bodies. CII works to create and sustain an environment conducive to the development of India, partnering with Industry, Government, and civil society, through advisory and consultative processes. For more than 126 years, CII has been engaged in shaping India's development journey and works proactively on transforming Indian Industry's engagement in national development. The Ministry of Labour and Employment has initiated Model Career Centre (MCC) through CII at 23 locations and 38 aspirational districts in India to provide a variety of employment-related services. #### Advanced Welding Lab at JSS Sindhudurg

In a significant stride towards skill development and empowerment, JSSS collaborated with CII to establish a specialised welding lab in 2022. The donation from CII enabled the setup of an



advanced welding lab equipped with state-ofthe-art machinery including TIG, MIG, gas, and arc welding machines. This lab serves as a hub for imparting training in advanced industrial welding techniques and fabrication processes.

One of the most remarkable aspects of this endeavour is its inclusivity. Trainees hailing from rural areas, economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and girls are provided with an opportunity to acquire specialised skills in welding. This inclusivity not only promotes gender equality but also addresses the disparity in access to vocational training among different socio-economic groups.

The courses offered in the advanced welding lab cover a wide spectrum of topics ranging from basic welding techniques to advanced fabrication processes. Participants undergo comprehensive training that not only equips them with technical proficiency but also instils in them the confidence to pursue careers in welding and related industries.

#### **Empowering Women through Culinary Skills**

In collaboration with the CII, EDI offered specialised training courses in cake making and chocolate making during 2021-22. These initiatives aimed

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


